SANFORD STABLE PROMISING

To Start Year's Campaign with String of Thirty-two Racers.

Have Wintered at Charleston, Where Climatic Conditions Have Been Favorable.

Charleston, S. C., March 8.—If ever there was a stable indicating a prosperous year, it is that of John Sanford, which has wintered here. There are thirty-two horses in the collection, and every one is the picture of health, having enjoyed favorable climatic conditions that prevailed in the district.

The warm sunshine of the south has had its effect on the horses, which are as forward as necessary for an early campaign, which it is intended to give them. The entire stable will be shipped to Jamaica in April.

There have been few disagreeable days in Charleston this winter, and the horses have been out since January 1. All the older horses have been running in the paddocks throughout the winter, and they look as hardy and fit as diligent care can make them.

When Tiptop Witehet went into winter quarters he was somewhat of a runt and, while voted a fine horse on account of his disposition and ability, he was hardly considered in the upper ten division by most horsemen. Today he is a different horse. He has grown and spread out considerably and Mr. French declares no horse in the stable has done better.

LARGE LIST OF YOUNGSTERS.

There are twenty-three two-year-olds in the stable, fourteen of which are fillies, seven colts, and two geldings. The colts are an exceptionally fine band and, judging from their actions, are fine mannered. It will not be surprising to see an exceptional "crack" among the band. The fillies too are likely lookers, half a dozen of them being good enough to match on looks against any of the youngsters in any country. If outward appearances are an indication, there is more than one real good filly that will carry the Sanford colors this year.

Scrab Lady is a fine filly, dam the dam of Lucius. Dalinda is a sister to Quartz. Ute is a half brother of St. Isidore and Yellowstone and is a good looking individual. Illud Justice is a fine type of colt, dam the speedy Trance. Gene is by Whisk Broom II., and resembles his sire in more than color.

La Montagne was foaled in France and is of the small type, but is surely a racing machine, according to the stable help. This is a filly that was brought over by Delbert Reiff, and sold to Mr. Sanford last year. Marchesa II. is a French-bred filly by Rabelais-La Tosea II., the dam of Sir John Johnson. She is a filly of promise.

Alphe is one of the prides of the stable, being French-bred by the fashionable sire Sardanapale, and according to Mr. French, much resembles her sire, which was a great horse. Alphe is another of the Reiff band that was sold over here.

SPORTSMEN SERVICE IN WAR

None Has Made More Spontaneous Response Than the Ranks of Racing Devotees.

Sportsmen the world over have been the foremost to volunteer their services in war, but in no branch of outdoor recreation has the response been more spontaneous than in the ranks of the devotees of racing. Sometimes it has been necessary because of age limitations for the enthusiast to enlist under another flag than his own, but it is noteworthy that the same spirit has attracted all those who have found recreation in the horse of blood whether their avocation was that of the race course, the polo field or the show ring.

A conspicuous case in point is that of Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., who, before his eighteenth birthday, has distinguished himself for conspicuous bravery as a member of the Lafayette Escadrille in France. Rejected because of his age by the United States authorities, the youthful New Yorker sailed for France, and the cables carried the news of his triumphs in the air almost before he was missed by his associates in the hunting and racing colony at Westbury. "Tommy" Hitchcock, as he is called, comes by his sporting spirit honestly, his father having been a daring rider cross country, while his mother has followed the hounds and ridden at horse shows all her life. During the Red Cross exhibition at Madison Square Garden last November, Mrs. Hitchcock and her daughter were among the most admired experts who helped to make that affair a notable success.

When the war broke out Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., sold his stable of steeplechasers and offered his services to the government, as scores of others prominent in the world of racing had done. He is now in charge of the aviation training camp at Mherola, with the rank of captain.

While the home influence has had much to do in shaping the destiny of Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., he had an abundance of inspiration from relatives abroad, his cousin, M. Auguste Du Bos, being senior steward of the Steeplechase Society of France. M. Du Bos manages the steeplechase meetings at Auteuil and also finds time to look after the breeding and racing interests in France of Mr. Francis R. Hitchcock, one of the stewards of the Jockey Club, whose activities embrace a wide sphere both in France and in this country.

LETTER FROM YOUNG HITCHCOCK.

The following letter from young Hitchcock to his cousin in Paris gives an idea of the dangers and excitement incidental to the calling of the aviator:

On Way Home to Escadrille 87, Secteur Postal, January 7th, 1918.

Dear Cousin Auguste: Thank you very much for your nice note. Now I am on my way back to Escadrille 87 after a day of mixed experiences yesterday. I was doing some protection work when I saw a German plane over our lines quite a way off. I made for it and, after a chase of about fifteen minutes, succeeded in getting quite close.

He suddenly seemed to despair of getting away and veered round to get a fight. It was a lovely big two plane, but I did not think of that at the time.

He opened fire right off. The rat-tat-tat of his gun was quite distinct. We went round several circles, I trying to get under his tail and he trying to prevent me.

Finally I got in a good place under his tail and pretty close. The machine gunner could no longer touch me.

As soon as I opened fire he fell in a vrille. He vrilled from 5,000 metres to 2,000, me following him all that while. At 2,000 he seemed to make an effort to retreat and went with a very steep spiral. He spiraled right into the side of a hill in the Vosges Mountains. I followed him right down to the ground and circled around him, slanting like an idiot.

Then he was down near a little farm house. I don't know how long I should have stayed there gloating over him if it had not been for a German machine gun battery that shot up at me from the ground.

I had not realized that it was Germany I was over. I lost my way coming home and broke my landing gear on a forced landing a long way from Lunville.

I don't know yet if it will be an official victory or not, but have hopes. We fell a long way in Germany. Best love to all, Tommy.

C. T. WORTHINGTON OWN TRAINER

Stable Headed by the Good Filly Viva America, Candidate for Kentucky Derby and Oaks.

Louisville, Ky., March 8.—C. T. Worthington, whose horses were last year trained by Will Perkins, the well-known colored horseman, has decided to undertake the training of his own horses, and has already begun the work of getting them in condition for the spring season in Kentucky. The stable is headed by Viva America, the handsome three-year-old filly by McGee—Pink Rose, which last year proved to be one of the best juvenile fillies in the west. The filly has grown somewhat since last fall and has started in on her training in a manner that is most encouraging. It is Mr. Worthington's intention to point his crack filly for the Ashland Oaks at Lexington, for which she is one of the most prominent candidates. If she comes out of that race in good condition, she will be started in the Kentucky Derby, and possibly in the Oaks at Churchill Downs.

YOUNGSTERS IN H. H. HEWITT'S STABLE

H. H. Hewitt, wealthy eastern sportsman, whose stable is in training at the Lexington track in charge of John L. Smith, has given the name of "Thirteen" to one of his two-year-olds. The youngster is a colt by Coy Lad—Kin of Luck, and received his unique appellation partly through his dam, and because he was foaled on March 13, and is the thirteenth foal of his dam. Some of the other youngsters in the Hewitt barn are Jap, brown filly by Coy Lad—Inspiration; Ginger, chestnut colt, by Coy Lad—Lucky Wave; Sam Rhea, bay colt by Bay o' Day—Coy Maid (brother to Coy Lad and Meditation). The stable has entered its Lucky Day in the Kentucky Derby and other stakes for three-year-olds. This colt is reported to be doing well in his preliminary training, and is expected to develop into a colt of some repute. The four-year-old skeptic, winner of the Canadian Derby, will shortly be bred to several of Mr. Hewitt's mares, and may not be seen at the races this year.

BRIGHTON STABLE JUVENILES

Will Start Season on Maryland Tracks with Formidable String Under George Odom.

New York, March 8.—As usual with the Brighton Stable, it will start the 1918 season with a string of about two dozen young horses, in charge of George Odom, who has been most successful in the past, considering he is one of the rising generation of trainers. Both Odom and his employer believe in racing two-year-olds almost exclusively, depending on yearling colts to get one or two good horses out of a string of twenty or more.

Occasionally the Brighton Stable will purchase a promising youngster, if those in the barns are not good enough to pay expenses, as it did last year when Tiptop Witehet was added to the establishment, and sold in the autumn to John Sanford for \$20,500. In selecting yearlings the breeding of those in the possession of the Brighton Stable show that no one sire has been particularly, nearly every good stallion being represented.

Confirmation has been the set principle followed in purchasing, so long as the blood lines indicated a respectable showing of ancestry. Notable among the stallions represented in this year's crop of two-year-olds are such illustrious sires as Ballot, Peep o' Day, colt, Jack Atkin, Adam Bede, Bannockburn, Ben Brush, Fair Play, Phandit, Sweep and others of more or less note.

That an early start is contemplated for the horses is shown by the fact that a small number, those promising early development, will be raced at Bowie with William Shields in charge, while the others will remain in this section until Havre de Grace or Pimlico opens.

EASTERN RACERS IN STEADY WORK

Open Weather Permits Outdoor Training and Many Stables Are Preparing for Maryland.

New York, March 8.—With the more open weather during the past ten days, trainers at the tracks around New York have been making rapid progress in their preliminary work of conditioning racers. Though none has reached fast galloping yet, encouraging reports are being received from all sides.

Through the opening of the racing season on the Maryland circuit is nearly a month off, some of the trainers at Gravesend are making up their contingents for the Bowie and Havre de Grace meetings, and some of these will be shipped for Maryland this week. George Odom has a half dozen of the Brighton Stable's two-year-olds selected to be turned over to trainer W. Shields, who will take them to Maryland this week and race them there during the earlier meetings and probably until the close of that circuit.

This half dozen is made up of the two-year-olds She Devil, John Powers, Tiger Rose, Roderick Din, Jan of Arc and Chip, a majority of them racy-looking youngsters.

Steve Lawler, who has a moderate-sized stable in training at Gravesend, also is expected to ship his horses to Maryland in a few days, and Frank Weir, also a prominent member of the Gravesend training colony and one whose powerful stable has old Rosebud and Jack Hare Jr. at the head of the list, is said to be contemplating a move to Maryland in a few days.

G. W. LOFT BUYER OF LAUREL STOCK

New York, March 8.—From a reliable source it is learned that former trainer George W. Loft bought the 25 shares of stock in the Laurel track, sold by the trustees of the estate of the late P. J. Deyker. The major part of the stock is held by P. McKinney and James Butler, who own large individual interests, but the 25 shares reported to be held by Mr. Loft will almost if not quite control in case of a division of opinion between the McKinney and Butler interests.

MARTIAL NAMES FOR TWO-YEAR-OLDS

Louisville, Ky., March 8.—John Middleton, of this city, who in partnership with C. J. Jangleth, won the American Derby with The Bicket, and who is now associated with Lawrence Jones, also a Louisville man, in the ownership of the Pastime Stable, in charge of French Brooks at Churchill Downs, has given to a couple of the stable's two-year-olds, Service Flag is a bay colt by Ben Trovato—Royal Child II., and was bred by D. H. Chenault. Ragle Call is a bay gelding by Burgomaster and was purchased from Tracey & Walker. The fact that Mr. Middleton has two sons serving in the National Army may have impelled him to select two such timely names.

Trainer William Mulholland, in charge of the A. L. Rogers stable, will not be able to race the three-year-old gelding, George Duncan, this year. The horse has been suffering all winter with an attack of nasal catarrh and, despite expert treatment, his condition shows little improvement. He will be turned out at one of the nearby farms.

SURPRISE FROM ETRUSCAN

Defeats the Best Sprinters at Oaklawn in a Fast Race.

Favorites at a Discount in All but One Race, Harry Mason Providing the Exception.

Hot Springs, Ark., March 8.—The Arlington Hotel Handicap of \$700, for sprinters at three-quarters, developed one of the best finishes of the present meeting, also an outstanding surprise when Etruscan, which, in a previous start, was beaten off, won by a nose from Top of the Morning, with Jack Scot the same narrow back of the snail, and Paddy Winck only a nose farther away. The winner was lucky to score and in a few more strides would not have been placed, as the trio behind him were charging down in resolute style and gaining rapidly. Jack Scot ran as if best, but his defeat was largely due to poor riding that Wackoff gave him. From an outside position he was forced to race for the entire way and, when it was necessary for the horse to be ridden strongly, the rider in his effort to use his whip threw it away and at the end he was barely holding on. Top of the Morning, despite having been soundly beaten by Jack Scot in their previous meeting, was the favorite, while the winner was one of the outsiders.

With the exception of the handicap, the other five races brought out the poorest of the racers in these parts, but their even calibre resulted in interesting sport. The backers were all at sea in their calculations and, with the single exception of Harry Mason, which beat a band of maidens that opposed him, all the choicest were downed. The slaughter of the favorites began with the opening race, when Master McGrath succumbed in easy style to Adaline.

Jessie C. led all the way in the third race, for which Scullywag was the choice, but failed to get a place. Impression and High Horse staged a rattling contest in the fifth race, for which Mary Warren was the favorite.

Sen Fredin was the offending choice in the last race, Kilmer winning it in easy style and making it his second victory of the meeting.

T. C. McDOWELL LEAVES FOR HOME.

Thomas C. McDowell, after a brief visit, departed tonight for his home in Lexington. Jockey Frank Keogh has been requested by John S. Ward to engage for the coming season to do the riding for Ward's stable, which includes Escoba, intended to be a starter in the Kentucky Derby, and one of the favorites. Keogh, because of a verbal agreement to ride in the east, will be unable to ride for Mr. Ward, but is eager to have the mount on Escoba and will arrange to secure the necessary consent to fill the engagement.

John Hyner of Latonia, Ky., well known in racing circles in Kentucky, was an arrival and will make an extended visit. Jockey Majestic was suspended for six days by the stewards for rough riding in the third race.

The horses owned by W. E. Matthews were arrivals this morning from New Orleans. They were the last to leave the Crescent city. Adeline L. raced this afternoon in the colors of S. Louis, who bought her on private terms from H. Field.

J. C. Ferriss disposed of Kenward on private terms to Solomon and Jarmon. Jockey Mooney's riding horse will be confined to the stable of his contract employer, G. H. Phillips, according to notice of the judges this afternoon.

Jockey Burt will ride this year for the stable of Robert L. Terry, whose horses are being trained by T. T. Patterson, who developed and trained Omar Kingman.

Today's attendance was again of generous proportions, this too, in spite of bleak weather, which improved steadily as the afternoon progressed. Ring action was again heavy considering the difficult fields that started in five of the afternoon's races.

The condition books for the next seven days of racing were distributed among the horsemen this afternoon. In the new book every race calls for an entrance fee of \$10.

JOCKEY GRUBER BACK IN HARNESS

Louisville, Ky., March 8.—Jockey Gruber, the local rider, whose contract was bought last December by A. L. Rogers, and who contracted typhoid fever while en route to this city from Havana, was able to today to start work galloping horses after being confined to the hospital for several weeks. The youngster lost hardly any weight during his long siege of illness. He is expected to develop into one of the best riders on the Kentucky circuit this year.

Joe Hubbard has at Churchill Downs the useful platers Dougro and DeLani, which he is preparing for the spring season in Maryland. He expects to ship the pair to Havre de Grace in a couple of weeks.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

Last Sunday's attendance at Oriental Park was one of the largest of the meeting. James Rowe, it is said, plans to start Rosie O'Grady in both the Kentucky Derby and Kentucky Oaks. He has hopes that she may turn out to be another Regret.

J. F. Scholts, one of Toronto's oldest and best known sportsmen, died in that city last Monday at the age of 73. Mr. Scholts was fond of horses and an ardent admirer of racing.

STALLS RESERVED FOR McLEAN STABLE

Louisville, Ky., March 8.—George Strate, in charge of the stable of J. H. Kossiter, the California new recruit to racing, has wired superintendent Tom Young of his intention of shipping seven horses to Churchill Downs, the shipment to arrive March 10. The big stable of Edward B. McLean, now quarantined at the Belmont track in charge of John F. Schorb, is due to arrive about the same date. Twenty stalls have been reserved for the McLean runners.
